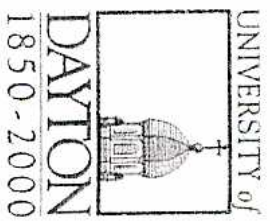


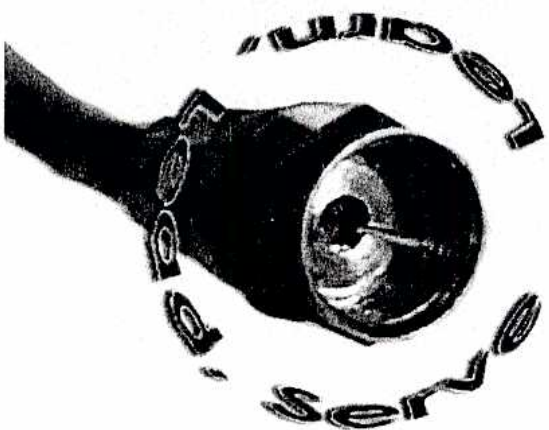

ABOUT OHECC

The Ohio Higher Education Computing Council (OHECC) was originally organized in the early 1970s as a quarterly meeting of the directors of computing of the thirteen public universities in Ohio in order to discuss common problems and solutions. It grew through the addition of assistant directors and senior managers to the group, and by the mid-1980s private institutions began to attend the meetings as well.

Today, OHECC is still an informal organization which holds meetings in the spring and fall of each year with one of the larger member institutions acting as host on a rotating basis. Typically it attracts 175-200 registrants from all kinds of institutions of higher education in Ohio with a few others from Indiana and Kentucky (and often Michigan when it is held in Toledo). The host is responsible for all local arrangements and the program, which therefore varies quite a bit.

The theme for the Fall 1999 OHECC Conference is "Using Technology to Learn, Lead, and Serve." This theme parallels UD's Vision 2005 that is the driving force behind the major technology initiatives presently being implemented at UD. The breakout sessions on Thursday afternoon and Friday morning will focus on areas related to UD's unique Learning Village implementation, Administrative Systems, Networking, and Instructional Computing initiatives.
